Help Is on the Way: New COVID-19 Vaccines Arrive in the US

Here is all you need to know about the new Moderna and Pfizer vaccines so that you can be informed about them when they are available.

How They Work

Both the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are mRNA vaccines. This stands for Messenger RNA. The vaccines use a spike protein that makes your body think you have covid (when you don't). When your body detects the protein, it will think it has a virus. Then it will start to produce antibodies to fight the virus if you happen to catch it.

Who Will Get Them

The very first people to get them will be healthcare workers, doctors and nurses, and then people in nursing homes. The next people will be other first responders like firefighters and other essential workers who are not healthcare workers. The next wave will be adults of high -

risk conditions and people of 65 years or older. The last wave will be all of us, the "Normal" people. Different states have different standards for "Frontline workers" or "People of high risk," so depending on where you live you might get it sooner than others.

Other facts

- The new vaccines need to be kept at very cold temperatures.
- The first person in NJ to be vaccinated is Maritza Beniquez, who is a nurse.
- Taking the vaccine will not make you test positive for COVID-19.
- The Pfizer vaccine is about 95% effective against the virus and the Moderna vaccine is 94.1% effective against the disease.

Kamala Harris: First Black, Asian, and Female Vice President

Family

Kamala Harris is the daughter of two immigrants who came to the United States to study at the University of California at Berkeley. Her mother, Shyamala Gopalan Harris, was born in India, and her father, Donald Harris, is from Jamaica. According to Harris' website, she said she had a "stroller-eye view" of the Civil Rights movement. Her parents eventually divorced when she was only 7 years old. Her mother was a breast cancer researcher and her father was an economics professor. Kamala Harris credits her mother in raising her to be a "strong Black woman." Kamala Harris married Doug Emhoff in 2014. She has two stepchildren who call her "Momala." She also has a sister named Maya.



Making History

Kamala Harris is 56 years old. She was born on October 20, 1964 in Oakland, California. She is the first Asian and Black woman to become the Vice President elect of the United States! She is a member of the Democratic Party. She will become the Vice President on January 20, 2021, and she also is the highest ranking woman. Kamala Harris was the attorney general of California. She graduated from Howard University and the University of California. She was elected senator in 2017. Some of the most inspiring words that she has said were in her victory speech on November 7th: "Every little girl watching tonight sees that this is a country of possibilities. And to the children of our country, regardless of your gender, our country has sent you a clear message: dream with ambition, lead with conviction, and see yourself in a way that others might not see you, simply because they've never seen it before. And we will applaud you every step of the way."

Joe Biden: 2020 President Elect

Biden's dog Major will be the first ever rescue dog to live in the White House, along with his other dog, Champ. Life on Venus?

Today, nobody has found life on Venus. There are surface temperatures reaching very high, and the pressure is 90 times that of Earth. The conditions on Venus make water-based life as we know it unlikely to survive on the surface of the planet.

The possibility of life on Venus is a subject of interest in astrobiology, "the branch of biology concerned with the study of life on earth and in space." To date, no proof has been found of past or present life on Venus. Theories say significantly since the early 1960s, when spacecrafts began studying the planet, it became clear that its environment is extreme compared to Earth's. However, there is ongoing study as to whether life could have



existed on the Venusian surface before a "runaway greenhouse gas" took hold, and a related study as to whether a relict biosphere could persist high in the modern Venusian atmosphere.

Winter Holidays: Do You Know What People Celebrate?

Christmas: Is your friend Christian? Then they likely celebrate Christmas. Christmas is the historical celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. Christmas traditions vary around the world. Christmas falls during Australia's summer, where it is popular to go camping or to the beach over the holiday. Some Australians decorate a "Christmas Bush," a native Australian tree with small green leaves and flowers that turn red during the summer. In England, Christmas traditions are similar to those in the United States, but instead of leaving milk and cookies for Santa Claus, children leave mince pies and brandy for Father Christmas! Cool right?

Hanukkah: Hanukkah, which can also be spelled Chanukah, is an 8 day celebration. Jewish people celebrate this holiday. They light a candle on each of 8 days on a menorah, which is a special "lamp holder" meant to hold candles. This started because the Jewish people had won a war and went to a temple where there was only enough oil for one day, but it listed 8 whole days.

Kwanzaa: Kwanzaa was created by Dr. Maulana Karenga in 1966 after the Watts riots in Los Angeles. He founded the US Organization, a cultural organization, and started to research African "first fruit" (harvest) celebrations. Kwanzaa comes from the phrase "matunda ya kwanza" which means first fruit in Swahili. Families celebrate Kwanzaa with singing, dancing, drums, storytelling, poetry reading, and a large feast with family! It is held on December 26 and ends on January 1.

Boxing Day: Boxing Day also starts on December 26. It is not celebrated in a lot of countries. The holiday started in the United Kingdom. It was the day when the alms box, collection boxes for the poor often kept in churches, were opened and their content distributed, a tradition that still happens in some areas. It was also the day servants were traditionally given the day off to celebrate Christmas with their families. Boxing Day has now become a public holiday in the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, among other countries.

Happy New Year!



Snowman Sticks

All you need: Shish kebab sticks, scissors, tape, white paper, black paper, red paper, orange paper, and glue.

All you need: A plain white t-shirt, fork, green and red dye, water, squirt bottles, and large rubber bands.

After you do that, secure it with rubber bands around the entire shirt. Mix your red and green dye with water in your squirt bottles, and then you are ready to start coloring! Color the entire shirt in red and green (or you can leave some places white). When you are finished, let the dye soak in for at least 24 hours before rinsing the shirt in cold water, then wash it before wearing.



Grape Leaf and Ground Beef Recipe

You will need:

- 1 lb of grape leaves
- 1 lb of ground beef
- 2 medium onions
- 10 slices of garlic
- · Salt & black pepper
- · Ground green parsley

Grape Leaf and Ground Beef, Continued

Instructions:

- Step 1: Chop the onions.
- Step 2: Add the ground beef, onions, salt and pepper, & ground green parsley together in a bowl.
- Step 3: Wash the grape leaves, take off the little end part, and unfold the leaves.
- Step 4: Make the ground beef the size of your index finger and put it on the grape leaves. Roll the leaf around the ground beef. Repeat this step until you run out of beef or grape leaves.
- Step 5: Put all of your beef-filled grape leaves in a pot with 1.5 cups of water, more salt and pepper, and garlic. You can also add 2 tablespoons of butter.
- Step 6: Turn the burner to high for 30 minutes, then low for 30 minutes.
- Step 7: Enjoy!

Cookies & Cream Cheesecake Bundt "Box" Cake Recipe

You will need:

- 16 oz cream cheese, softened
- ½ cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 box chocolate cake mix, prepared accordingly to box instructions
- · 10 chocolate sandwich cookies
- 8 oz high quality chocolate, 60% cocoa content or higher, chopped finely
- 2 cups heavy cream

Instructions:

- Preheat the oven to 350°F (180°C).
- In a medium bowl, whisk together the cream cheese, powdered sugar, and vanilla extract, stirring until smooth.
- Pour half of the cake batter into the bottom of a greased bundt cake pan, smoothing it with a spatula.
- With an ice cream scoop, scoop the cream cheese mixture evenly onto the cake batter, making sure that it does not touch the sides of the cake pan.
- Place a chocolate sandwich cookie on top of the cream cheese scoops, making a circle around the ring
 of the pan.
- Pour the rest of the cake batter on top of the cookies, smoothing it evenly.
- Bake for 45 minutes, then cool completely.
- Invert the cake onto a wire rack set on top of a baking tray.
- To make the glaze, microwave the chocolate and the cream together in 30-second intervals, stirring in between, until the glaze is smooth and glossy.
- Pour the glaze over the cake, letting the excess drip off the wire rack and onto the baking tray. Once the glaze has set, slice the cake and serve. Enjoy!
